

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Recommends Removal of the Fifth Avenue Dam

In a draft of a long-awaited feasibility study, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers recommended removal of the Fifth Avenue Dam to help restore the ecosystem of the Lower Olentangy Watershed. After studying a variety of options, including partial dam removal, the Army Corps concluded that full removal provided the most benefit for habitat and water quality in the stretch between the Dodridge St. Dam and the confluence with the Scioto.

The Army Corps will finalize the report to include public comments and then present it to the City of Columbus Department of Public Utilities for consideration. The City is considering the removal of the dam as a Supplemental Environmental Project. The project forms part of the settlement of an enforcement order and agreement with the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency.

Rain Barrels: Sold Out

A rain barrel is a great way to catch water from your roof for use in outdoor watering. This practice saves you money on your water bill and also helps to reduce stormwater runoff into the Olentangy and its tributaries.

This year, FLOW received funding from the City of Columbus Department of Public Utilities to hold five rain barrel workshops to distribute 30 rain barrels at a cost share price of \$30 each. Because the program proved to be so popular, we sought and received funding for an additional 100 barrels. However, even with the additional funding, we quickly sold out of barrels and are now taking names to receive information about workshops in spring 2008.

Although we regret the inconvenience to those who wished to receive barrels for this year, we are nevertheless excited that there is so much interest in rain barrels and water conservation. We are currently looking at ways to make the program more widely available in 2008.
